Introduction

The 2025 season, running from February to early December, began with the distribution of our first fixtures on February 8th. This year, we circulated just under 16,000 fixtures to clubs across CCC1 and CCC2 covering the age grades under 8 to under 16.

Central to this effort is our mission to maximize playing opportunities for our young members. By delivering a structured and reliable fixture calendar, we aim to support the participation of all stakeholders—players, mentors, and parents—in hurling and football.

CCC1 Go Games Programme (U8 to U12)

The CCC1 programme remains the bedrock of our juvenile activity. In 2025, just over 11,500 fixtures were issued, split almost evenly between football and hurling. This reflects a marginal year-on-year increase of +0.5% in participation numbers for both codes. Activity levels have recovered to those seen in 2022, following a slight decline in 2023.

The CCC1 season commenced on Saturday, February 8th, with U12 football grading games. All five age groups were in action for hurling the following Saturday, February 15th, with the full football season beginning on February 22nd. It remains CCC1 policy to schedule the opposite code to CCC2 each Saturday morning, an objective successfully managed in the early months and for the post-summer activity.

Following the grading process in early January 2025, club team entries at U8, U9, U10, and U11 (1,649 teams) were committed to their initial groupings until the end of June. For the post-summer programme, CCC1 allowed clubs to request group changes to accommodate fluctuations in player numbers for the remainder of the season. While many changes were requested, the volume was consistent with a typical year.

Cathaoirleach CCC1, Maura Ryan, will provide further detail on the CCC1 season later in this report.

CCC2 Programme (U13 to U16)

The 2025 season for the CCC2 programme (U13 to U16) commenced on the weekend of February 8th & 9th. By the weekend of February 22nd & 23rd, all age grades in both football and hurling had begun. This year, CCC2 organised and ran 335 competitions—an increase on the previous year—issuing approximately 4,000 fixtures. A total of 685 teams participated, comprising 384 football and 301 hurling teams. A more detailed analysis of these entries will be provided later in this report.

The programme delivered a structured schedule of matches for our young players, ensuring consistent activity throughout the season:

- **U13:** 14 match dates each for Football and Hurling.
- **U14:** 13 match dates each for Football and Hurling.
- **U15:** 11 match dates each for Football and Hurling.
- **U16:** 13 match dates each for Football and Hurling.

At the time of writing, some competitions remain ongoing due to adverse weather conditions in October and November. The programme is now expected to be fully completed by December 7th. Despite these challenges, the committee has worked diligently to ensure that the season does not conclude prematurely for the majority of teams.

In line with feedback from clubs, the committee continues to avoid scheduling matches on Bank Holiday weekends and refrains from planning a full programme of activity during July and August.

A key development for 2025 was the amendment of the Féile format. The new "Revised Multiple Weekends with a Finals Day" structure has received very positive feedback. This format successfully maintained the Shield competitions while reinstating the traditional Féile experience. It effectively balances competitive participation with the core essence of Féile: enjoyment for players and their families. The blended approach of some lead up games followed by the finals day was massively positive. I am pleased to report that this year featured twenty-two (22) Féile Cup Finals and twenty-two (22) Féile Shield Finals. Given its success, this format will be continued for Féile 2026.

Finally, CCC2 has fully implemented the new GAA Football rules for all age groups. The rollout has been successful, with no issues reported and generally positive feedback. A further discussion with clubs regarding the kick-out rule at the Under-13 level is planned.

Additionally, referee feedback indicates a noticeable, positive difference in behaviour between hurling and football games!!!

Cathaoirleach CCC2, Declan Coulter, will provide further detail on the programme later in this report, and I fully endorse his comments.

Through The Years: A Journey of Growth (2010-2025)

Our Club Nurseries serve as the welcoming introduction for young players to the world of Dublin GAA. In these foundational settings, children learn essential motor skills—running, jumping, catching, and kicking—which act as the critical building blocks for all future sporting activity.

As previously noted, the CCC1 programme forms the bedrock of our juvenile games structure. Dublin has been a national leader in implementing the Go Games philosophy within our Under-8 to Under-12 programmes. This commitment to development-focused participation is reflected in a remarkable statistic: over the 15 years between 2010 and 2025, we have seen a +93% increase in Go Games participation, a trend informed by our two formal reviews of the initiative in 2017 and 2022.

While Nursery and CCC1 programmes lay the essential groundwork for a child's holistic development, the transition through the teenage years is critical. The CCC2 programme is the vital bridge during this period, designed to nurture a player's continued progress and foster a pathway to long-term involvement in Minor and, ultimately, Adult games.

The data below presents a comparative analysis of club team entries in all competitions (from Under-8 to Under-16, in both Hurling and Football) for the years 2010 and 2025. The subsequent observations and analysis will concentrate specifically on the data for CCC2 (U13-U16) entries.

The purpose of this analysis is not to identify the most successful clubs, but to highlight our strategic goal of moving young players from the nursery stages into and through the critical Minor age grade. It is important to note that this is not a direct like-for-like comparison, as demographic shifts and player retention rates (e.g., how many of 2010's U16s are still playing) are separate considerations. The CCC2 structure, which prevents players from playing on multiple teams, ensures the data's integrity.

Overall Trend: Significant Growth

The most encouraging finding is the **+90% overall growth** in team entries for the U13 to U16 age groups between 2010 and 2025. This underscores a major success story at the grassroots level over the past 15 years.

Spotlight on Club Performance

While the overall trend is positive, the growth has not been uniform. The data reveals clubs that have expanded significantly, new clubs that are now participating, and others that have faced challenges.

Notable Growth & New Entrants:

- **Largest Team Increases:** Three clubs saw a significant growth, adding 14 teams each: Ballinteer St Johns (+140%), Castleknock (+156%), and St Brigids (+175%).
- **Highest Percentage Growth:** Beann Eadair (+800%), Erin Go Bragh (+700%), Garda Westmanstown Gaels (+500%), and O'Dwyer's (+833%).

- **New CCC2 Participants:** Several clubs that had no teams in 2010 are now active contributors: Cabinteely, Innisfail, Na Gael Óga, Ranelagh Gaels, Shankill, St Kevin Killians, Starlights, Stars of Erin, Tyrrelstown, and Wanderers.

Code-Specific Drivers:

- **Hurling-Led Growth:** Fingallians (7 of 11 new teams) and Nh Mearnog (5 of 11).
- **Football-Led Growth:** St Sylvesters (11 new teams, 8 of which are in Football).

Areas of Concern:

- **Reduced Entries:** Some clubs have seen a decrease in teams, including Ballyfermot Gaels, Good Counsel Liffey Gaels, Nh Fionnbarra, Pobal Parnell, Robert Emmets, Scoil Ui Chonaill, Setanta, St Colmcilles, St James Gaels An Caislean, St Marks, and St Peregrines.
- **Inactive Clubs:** Three clubs that existed in 2010—Adamstown, St Bernadettes, and St Josephs OCB—had no juvenile entries in 2025.

Conclusion and Call to Action

In summary, while the +90% growth is substantial, it has not been shared by all clubs. Furthermore, this expansion has not been matched by a 90% increase in playing facilities and pitches, creating a new set of challenges.

This data demonstrates the impact of strategic investment in Dublin GAA. The County Board identified the potential for growth and acted, supporting clubs through initiatives like Club Games Promotion Officers, which worked in tandem with the invaluable groundwork of volunteers. It is now crucial that we collaborate with clubs facing obstacles to ensure continuous development for every player in the critical U13 to U16 age group.

Discipline

With a juvenile programme comprising nearly 16,000 fixtures this year, the sheer volume of games makes it inevitable that some disciplinary issues will arise.

The data below covers all fully processed cases since the last report (as of this writing, approximately 18 active cases remain, with games still to be played).

Key Year-on-Year Disciplinary Metrics:

- **209** Disciplinary Notices issued (compared to 224 in 2024).
- **€6,700** in total club fines (compared to €6,100 in 2024). (*Notably, one club was fined three times and another twice*).
- **176** Straight Red Cards issued to players (compared to 181 in 2024).
- **15** Clubs received formal warnings regarding future behaviour (18 in 2024).

Analysis and Recommendations

From a statistical viewpoint, disciplinary notices were issued for **1.3% of all fixtures**. While it is possible that not all CCC1 incidents are reported to Parnell Park, CCC2 mandates that referees return match reports and actively follows up with those who fail to do so. For CCC2 games specifically, the rate rises to 5%.

For the **11,500 Go Games fixtures**, we strongly recommend that clubs—primarily through their Juvenile Officers—attempt to resolve any issues locally before escalating the matter to CCC1. Based on my conversations with clubs, I know this practice is already occurring and should be encouraged as a first step. It is important to note that if a satisfactory resolution is not reached, the matter can still be formally forwarded to me for investigation by CCC1.

CCC2 Referees: A Persistent Crisis Requiring Immediate Club Action

Last year, this section was headlined, "Here I Go Again: Another Year, Another Report, and Still No Progress." It included an analysis of the "active" referees supplied by clubs, with the hope that highlighting shortcomings would prompt action. Regrettably, this did not occur, necessitating a similar exercise again this past July.

The referee crisis will not resolve itself. Clubs must step up—now—to ensure their teams can play as scheduled. This summer, the ongoing and severe shortage of referees was reiterated to clubs as the most pressing challenge facing CCC2. Despite these repeated appeals, the number of referees supplied by clubs remains far below what is required to cover our fixtures. This chronic shortfall creates immense weekly difficulties in assigning and replacing officials, directly undermining the integrity and smooth running of our competitions.

A Path Forward and a Call to Action

To help address this, the Coaching and Games department has amended and restructured the old Level 3 course into the new "Referee of Youth Games." The entry requirements are clear: candidates must be 18 or over, Garda vetted, and fully registered members of a GAA club.

We once again implore all clubs to urgently review their referee contributions, actively promote this new course, and take immediate action to recruit new match day officials.

Acknowledging a Key Volunteer

To illustrate the scale of the challenge, CCC2 scheduled just under 4,000 fixtures this season. Each week, Danny Harrington, a dedicated volunteer, assigns approximately 160 referees. On average, 60 of these games require reassignment, demanding over 100 additional interventions from initial assignment to updating the website. We extend our profound gratitude to Danny for his tireless work in managing this immense logistical challenge under constant pressure.

Conclusion

I wish to extend my sincere gratitude to all the officers of Bord na nÓg, CCC1, CCC2, the Juvenile Hearings Committee, and the County Hearings Committee for their invaluable assistance and support throughout the year. In particular, I would like to acknowledge the guidance and leadership of Declan O'Leary (Cathaoirleach, Coiste na nÓg), Maura Ryan (Cathaoirleach, CCC1), and Declan Coulter (Cathaoirleach, CCC2).

A special word of thanks is due to the Club Go Game Referee Coordinators. Week after week, they allocate nearly 400 referees for the Go Games programme—a role I have always felt is critically important yet undervalued. I wish to formally acknowledge and thank them for their indispensable work. I would also like to reiterate my thanks to Danny Harrington for his monumental contribution in assigning referees for over 4,000 CCC2 fixtures this year.

My appreciation also goes to my colleagues in Parnell Park, particularly County Secretary Finbarr O'Mahony, Ger O'Connor, and Paddy Maloney, for his steadfast support in helping the juvenile committees host our meetings. I am also grateful to County Chairman Ken O'Sullivan for his leadership.

A particular note of thanks must go to Anne O'Dea for her exceptional work and dedication in keeping the show on the road this year.

Finally, I thank all club officials, delegates, mentors, and referees for their unwavering support in 2025. I look forward to our continued collective efforts to ensure that every young player, regardless of ability, is provided with the opportunity to develop and thrive within the GAA family.

As we look ahead to 2026, it is vital to remember that our clubs are the bedrock of our communities. Even without major on-field success, they provide a vital recreational outlet for children of all skill levels. Our clubs send a powerful message to every child: you belong. By doing their best collectively with mentors, parents, and teammates, our young players do more than just build teams—they foster a profound and enduring sense of community.

Go Games Programme

In January 2025 995 football teams and 885 hurling teams were entered in the CCC1 Go Games programme. There was an increase of 0.8 % in football teams and 0.1 % in hurling teams in 2025. The scheduled games commenced on 15th February and concluded 1st November. Friendlies for U8-U12 teams are still being scheduled both inside and outside the county. Apart from the 9-week summer break, our young players participated in an impressive number of games. I think we are unique in Dublin to arrange so many games for all players involved.

I'm thrilled for our many U12 players, where their teams secured spots in the top two in their league. All players received medals for their efforts. I wish them all the very best as they enter into CCC2 games structure in 2026.

Our blitzes for U8-U11 were a great success again this year and I am delighted to have them in our games schedule. Again, CCC1 decided to run Football for U8 in April, Hurling for U9 age group in June, Football for U10 in September and Hurling for U11 in October. Each club hosted about three teams. Every player took part in a morning of games and received a medal. The younger players enjoyed the event and are excited for the next blitz in 2026. Thanks to Damian for arranging pitches and fixtures for everyone.

Discipline

Overall, considering the number of games played, discipline was generally quite good this year. We have addressed several referee reports. Writing about games with difficult behaviour is challenging for young referees. Clubs should remind mentors, players and parents: GIVE RESPECT GET RESPECT. Abuse of our referees is NEVER acceptable.

CCC1 treats every report with the utmost seriousness and conducts thorough investigations into each incident. Clubs may be subject to fines for engaging in such behaviour. This is where younger players start their journey as a referee. Many leave due to pressure, but we can help by letting referees manage the game!

Clubs should note that CCC1 will not tolerate sideline misconduct toward referees, players, or opposition mentors, even when defending their own mentors.

Thanks

I would like to thank everyone who has helped make CCC1 programme successful this year. I extend my sincere appreciation to my colleagues on CCC1, including Paul, for his dedicated efforts and hard work throughout the year. I would like to welcome Liam and Diarmuid on board the committee. Thanks to Finbar O'Mahony, Runaí Dublin County Board and Ken O'Sullivan, Cathaoirleach Dublin County Board for their constant support of our young players. Thanks also to Declan O'Leary, Cathaoirleach Bord na nÓg and Declan

Coulter, Cathaoirleach CCC2. I would like to extend my appreciation to Anne O'Dea, who diligently manages several email addresses including admin and juvresults.

I would like to thank all the volunteers at club level who make it all happen week in week out. To all the referee coordinators who ensure the teams have referees for their games, to all pitch coordinators who allocate pitch space to home teams and to all the team mentors who ensure the young players get to play their games at the weekend. Above all, I want to express my gratitude to the players and their parents for their dedication, which made our hurling and football programme successful this year.

While many focus on club level, Damian plans for Dublin by seeking ways to promote both codes and encourage young players to join and remain in GAA early on. CCC1 owes its success in Dublin to his assistance and organisational skills.

Chairperson CCC2 Annual Report

At the time of writing this report we are coming to our final weekend of competitions concluding with the under 16 Championship finals along with a couple of postponed under 14 cup finals. Participation levels have increased slightly for this year over 2024 (football +2% Hurling +1%) and I am aware that Damian Murphy (Rúnaí Coiste na nÓg) will go into much more detail in his report. We run an extensive games programme with both football and hurling offered an equal number of calendar dates.

- U13 = 14 Dates per code
- U14 = 13 Dates per code
- U15 = 11 Dates per code
- U16 = 13 Dates per code

As with most years there are challenges when setting out and implementing the games programme and this year came with the added challenge of the new football rules. While there were many concerns surrounding this it was agreed at the club delegates meeting at the beginning of the year to implement the new rules fully. Concerns around the marking of pitches were in the main put to rest with the majority of club and indeed council pitches being marked with the new large arc (some exceptions with all-weather pitches)

Our games programme would not be a success or indeed would not be possible without the great work and commitment from all involved and I would like to thank club delegates, club officers, committee members and all who commit their time and energy to supporting and promoting our juvenile games programmes.

I would also like to take this opportunity to congratulate all who compete for their teams, clubs, family and supporters and for their own personal enjoyment. Congratulations to teams that were successful in taking home silverware.

Competitions

As with most years the weather at some stage will cause us to lose some dates with pitches being called off and this year was no different (although not the worst). Once again, with help and support from mentors and clubs with rescheduling matches we have managed to finish most competitions in line with the calendar dates. In the main we continued our 2025 programme of competitions on the same basis as 2024 in terms of league and championship format which has been very successful to date.

U13 - 5 Grading games followed by leagues

U14 – Phase 1 = 5 games, Phase 2 = 5 games followed by knockout (semi & finals)

U15 – Feile (Round Robin 3 group dates followed by semi & finals day) followed by league.

U16 – League followed by championship

From 2020 to 2024 Feile na Gael and Feile na Peil was run on a multi weekend basis which allowed us to include shield competitions and give teams more games and allow more teams to compete in semi-finals and finals. To bring back the Feile feel and occasion that a number of clubs believed was being lost, the committee (in consultation with club delegates) introduced for this year's Feile, a semi/finals day hosted at several club venues [Football x 12 venues, Hurling x 10 venues]. This format allowed for the Feile occasion to be celebrated while keeping our shield competitions that have become so important in maintaining player participation.

The requirement for panels to be submitted at a certain stage of competitions has helped to balance the competitions and stop clubs from moving players between A & B teams to gain an advantage and will be continued into the 2026 season. At a recent club delegates meeting there was much debate surrounding panels and the requirement for same.

Referees

Once again, another year has passed and unfortunately, we are still faced with the challenge of not having enough referees to cover all our games on a weekly basis. We can talk of how we have a great games programme but none of it would be possible or indeed as successful without our referees and a special thank you to all who referee our games on a weekly basis.

There is a huge amount of work and effort put into allocating referees to games on a weekly basis and all of this is done in the background by our referee coordinator. On this note a special thanks to Danny Harrington for his tireless work to make all this happen each week.

The responsibility for supplying referees for our games is the responsibility of all clubs and this year again it is disappointing to see some clubs enter multiple teams at the various age groups and yet supply a minimal number of referees or none at all.

This shortage of referees is now a serious issue which could put our games programme at risk. Once again, the plea from CCC2 to all clubs is to please look at the number of “active” referees you supply and encourage club members to get involved.

Discipline

Looking back on my report from last year I could simply have copied and pasted my comments as little has changed this year. Some mentors, supporters and sidelines in general seem to think it is acceptable to verbally abuse or threaten referees and more alarmingly there have been some instances of this abuse extending to players. This is not simply a numbers issue in terms of how many reported incidents versus the number of games played as the majority of our games proceed in a healthy sporting manner.

However, there is still an unacceptable level of discipline issues with some mentors, supporters and sideline behaviour in general.

- *Persistent challenging of referee authority*
- *Foul abusive and threatening language*
- *Threatening behaviour towards referees*
- *Following referees to car/carpark after a game*

CCC2 will continue to issue sanctions against individuals where possible but we ultimately hold clubs responsible for the behaviour of mentors, supporters and partisans and will issue sanctions against clubs.

We ask that clubs remind mentors, parents and supporters alike that any type of abusive behaviour is simply not acceptable and will not be tolerated.

2026- Calendar

We aim to issue a draft 2026 calendar within the next two weeks; however, we will work on the basis that the 2026 Calendar will mirror and follow the same format as this year.

- U13 - Grading League's followed by League (single round)
- U14 - Qualifying Round Robin in two phases, followed by Cup competitions.
- U15 - Dublin Féile multi-weekend model with Féile finals day followed by Leagues
- U16 - League & Championship model

We will also aim to keep with the exam and holiday break in late July through August.

Coiste Eisteachta na nÓg – Juvenile Hearings Committee Report -2025

Coiste Eisteachta na nOg is the Juvenile Hearings Committee. We arrange and conduct hearings sought by clubs into various disciplinary sanctions issued by CCC1 and CCC2. This year we met only once in person to deal with a number of cases. A number of other cases were dealt with online and via email. Almost all cases involved, unfortunately, misbehaviour by adults. We have only had a few hearings involving players in several years now, which suggests at least that on pitch matters and decisions by the ref and CCC2 are being respected.

I would like to thank all clubs who availed of our committee's procedures and Runai, Coiste na nOg, who were unfailingly polite and courteous to deal with. I would ask all clubs to be respectful of referees as we move forward into next season. Unfortunately, most of the cases that come before us often involve poor behaviour towards them which, in this day and age, really cannot be tolerated any more. While all parties are entitled to a fair hearing, this committee will not hold back from penalising people and clubs who abuse referees. It is also worth noting that young people imitate what they see adults doing. This needs to be borne in mind.

It's also incumbent on clubs to know the rules of seeking hearings and appealing decisions. I cannot stress this enough. A lot of clubs don't and this can often result in requests for hearings being ruled out of order. And when we are talking about children it is incumbent on you as clubs to give your players a chance to present their case should they so wish. We are not in a position to overrule the Official Guide so clubs must be aware of their role in making sure requests are submitted in a timely manner. It is also worth noting that some clubs

present their entire case in writing before a hearing which in many ways renders the hearing somewhat pointless as the committee has already received the information necessary to make a decision.

I would like to thank the members of the committee for their help and assistance during the year.
